LESSON SCRIPTURE

"Death and life are in the power of the tongue." Proverbs 18:21

STORY SUMMARY

Two frogs found themselves trapped in a deep hole. Despite discouragement from other frogs, one frog persevered and successfully climbed out.

BIBLE CORRELATE

In today's story, the discouraging words from the other frogs represent a negative influence that could have led both frogs to give up. However, one frog chose not to internalize the negativity and, through perseverance, overcame the challenges.

Proverbs 18:21 teaches, "The tongue has the power of life and death, and those who love it will eat its fruit." This verse underscores the idea that the words we speak can have a profound impact. Positive and encouraging words can bring life and inspiration, while negative and discouraging words can lead to despair and defeat.


